AR Level - Book Ratings

Is it OK for my child to read outside of her reading level? Just because a child can read the words in a book doesn't the content is appropriate. The interest level of the material must be considered. Interest level is based on content - a book's themes and ideas - are indicates for which age group a book is appropriate. The chant below shows which grades fall into each interest level.

Accelerated Reader uses these Interest Levels:

LG: Indicates the content is most appropriate for students in the lower grades (K-3).

MG: Indicates the content is most appropriate for students in the middle grades (4-8).

MG+: Indicates the content is most appropriate for students in the upper middle grades (6 and up). Most MG+ books are marketed as YA (Young Adult) for Interest Level.

UG: Indicates the content is most appropriate for students in the upper grades (9-12).

In many cases, a book's interest level coordinates with its book level. *Hank the Cowdog*, for example, the content of which is suitable for fourth graders, has a book level of 4.5. Many books, however, have a low book level but are appropriate for upper grades and vice versa. For example, Ernest Hemingways *The Sun Also Rises* has a book level of 4.4 because its sentences are short and its vocabulary is simple. The interest level, however, is UG for Upper Grades. In contrast, *Arthur Throws a Tantrum* has a book level of 4.9 because it contains fairly long words and sentences, but it is intended for students in lower grades.
